40 YEARS OF ALMA-ATA: TRANSLATING “HEALTH FOR ALL” INTO THE PRESENT AND FUTURE. A CIVIL SOCIETY WORKSHOP

The Alma-Ata Declaration of 1978 emerged as a major milestone in the field of global public health. Referring to the social, political and structural determinants of health, emphasizing the importance of accountability to the people, and proposing comprehensive Primary Health Care (PHC) as key to the attainment of the goal of Health for All, the Declaration still reads as a visionary and revolutionary text.

2018 is the year of commemorating and celebrating 40 years of the Alma-Ata declaration. The official “AA40” celebration will take place on 25-26 October 2018 in Kazakhstan in a “Second International Conference on Primary Health Care”. On 13-14 February, a “WHO global workshop on PHC to prepare for the jubilee conference in Almaty and for a high-level meeting on UHC in 2019” took place at the WHO headquarters. Since then, the WHO Secretariat also invited selected actors to join an “International Advisory Group on PHC for UHC for the 40th Anniversary of the Alma Ata Declaration”.

The G2H2 “Task Group 40 Years of Alma-Ata” was set up in summer 2017 in view of exploring options for a civil society led event in Geneva in 2018 to commemorate the jubilee of the Alma-Ata Declaration. The task group also submitted to the WHO Secretariat a concept for an official WHA side event on “40 Years of Alma-Ata: Translating ‘Health for All’ into the Future”.

OBJECTIVES

- **Provide a space for political analysis, reflection and mobilization:** We will critically revisit the Alma-Ata Declaration and the core principles expressed in it (in particular: addressing determinants of health; global solidarity for health equity; accountability to the people and communities, access to comprehensive health care services for all through a system structured around the principles of Comprehensive Primary Health Care) for its potential to be used as inspiration and guidance in our quest for Health for All.
- **Prepare/provide civil society input to a broader conversation:** Referring to a similar process ahead of the Alma-Ata conference in 1978 when NGOs submitted a position paper on PHC to WHO and UNICEF and to the current drafting process for a “renewed vision on PHC”, we will prepare and discuss a meeting statement on “Translating ‘Health for All’ into the Present and Future”.



Some food for thoughts</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Why so little interest in infection prevention and control (IPC) after Ebola? • LMIC structures are run down, little IPC put patients' lives at risk. In the USA, the CDC take pride in containment, what of the rest of the world? • Why emphasis on the production of new antibiotics alone? And under what form: private investments, PPPs or public investments? Where is the money? • Why stewardship is focusing on the poor patient at the end of the line rather than marketing, such as FDCs of antibiotics being produced and marketed? • Why no attention to the acute shortages in production of old yet effective generics? • Should we put antibiotics on the UNESCO list and put AMR under the SDGs? • Surveillance is great, but what of building laboratories in poor countries? • What role for water and sanitation, as waste is a main source of AMR? • Can we deal with the transmission and care for AMR infections in patients without more funding for health personnel and better health care delivery systems? • Is AMR control feasible without implementation of UHC and achievements of Alma Ata's goals of Health for All? <p>Session organizer and chair</p> <p>The session "AMR: Are We Off Track?" is organized and chaired by Garance Upham, Vice President, WAAAR.
